PASTOR'S PAGE – FOLLOWING JESUS IN WEST SEATTLE

The other day I was given a tour of the West Seattle Food Bank. I did not expect to find such an amazing place. I got to see where food is stored and prepared for pick-up or delivery. I also visited the "Reverend Ron Marshall Conference Room." Inside there are some photos and a plaque recognizing Pastor Marshall's service to the Food Bank. It read, in part, "A powerful and gracious driving force and steward of both the West Seattle Food Bank and the West Seattle Helpline."

Part of Pastor Marshall's legacy is helping the food bank become what it is today. I learned while I was there that on average, 500 people come for food assistance every day and another 200 receive food delivered to their homes each day. I met staff and volunteers and saw where the Helpline office is located. I was impressed with this outstanding outreach.

You are part of this outreach. You continue to give food and money on a regular basis. The St. Nicholas Faire and Cup of Blessings Dinner have been annual fundraisers for the food bank, bringing in tens of thousands of dollars. Why, I even bumped into a volunteer who is part of our First Lutheran community!

Food insecurity is a real issue. Too often, I forget. In my privilege, I assume everyone has easy access to food like me. It's easy to forget. We need constant reminders. Most of all, we need to hear the Gospel and follow Jesus into places where there is real human need. It is in those places where we meet Jesus. "I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me."(Matthew 25)

The West Seattle Food Bank is one ministry that we need to continue and one on which we can build and increase our support. There is a constant need for volunteers, food, and money.

Sharing Lent, Easter, and Pentecost with you has been a joy and a blessing. Now, we enter into the Sundays after Pentecost, also known as "Ordinary Time" or the long green and growing season. We immersed ourselves in the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection. Now, we listen to Jesus' parables, and stories about his ministry of healing and exorcising demons. All from the Gospel of Mark.

In late July and throughout all of August we will return to John's Gospel. In this period, the lectionary invites us to focus on Christ "the bread of life." Jesus' feeding of the multitudes, and his discourse on being the bread of life comprise the entire sixth chapter of John. In these weeks especially, we discover the vital link between Holy Communion and feeding the poor.

Maybe that will be a good time to hold up the ministry of the food bank and our participation, as individuals and, together, as the people of God at First Lutheran.



A SUPPLEMENTARY WORSHIP RESOUCE

In the next few months, you will see new red worship books in the pews alongside the green *Lutheran Book of Worship* that has been at the center of our worship life since its publication in 1978. *LBW*, with its rich liturgical settings and hymnody, will continue to occupy that central role now and in the future.

The new red book, *Evangelical Lutheran Worship (ELW)*, was published in 2006 as an alternative to *LBW*. Both books continue to be published and sold by Augsburg Fortress. Our intent is to use *ELW* primarily as a source for additional hymns to supplement those in *LBW*.

Over the past six years, I have compared the hymns in the two books in some detail.



Unsurprisingly, the majority of the hymns are common to both books. However, I identified about 140 hymns of high textual and musical quality in *ELW* that are not included in *LBW*, which I believe will enrich our worship life for years to come. These include hymns for every season of the church year, the sacraments of baptism and holy communion, and other more general hymns. They span centuries of Christian hymnody, from Martin Luther's paraphrase of *The Lord's Praver*, "Our Father, God in Heaven Above" to "Give Thanks for Saints," which pairs a new text with a majestic late 19th century English tune. ELW also includes many hymns with new texts by celebrated Lutheran poets including Jaroslav Vajda and Susan Palo Cherwien paired with new tunes by such distinguished Lutheran composers as Carl Schalk and Paul Manz. Some of these hymns have been sung by our choir as anthems. Others not subject to copyright restrictions, such as "Alleluia, Song of Gladness," have been sung by the congregation from bulletin inserts in re-

cent years. Additionally, *ELW* includes liturgies for Ash Wednesday and Holy Week patterned on those available only as separate publications for use with *LBW*, which we have inserted in applicable bulletins for many years. Also included is a complete book of Psalms, while *LBW* includes only those appointed for use in Sunday worship.

The purchase of *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* was made possible by a generous gift for worship resources from an anonymous donor in our congregation. We are grateful for this gift and its potential to expand the scope of hymnody in our parish.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

At the November 19, 2023 Special Congregational Constitution and Bylaw Changes Meeting, a number of changes were introduced, discussed, and voted on by the members present. The one amendment that did not pass was C11.02. This amendment is recommended to the membership by the church council. It will be voted on at the Mid-Year Meeting, Sunday, July 28, 2014 following the 10:30 am liturgy.

The original wording for C11.02 is as follows: "The officers shall be elected by the congregation and shall serve for two years. This election shall occur during the first General Meeting of the calendar year. Their term of office shall begin twenty-four hours following their election."

The proposed wording of C11.02 that failed to receive a majority is as follows: "The president and vice president shall be elected by the congregation and may serve two consecutive, two year terms. This election shall occur during the first General Meeting of the calendar year. Their term of office shall begin twenty-four hours following their election. No officer shall hold more than one office at a time. The President and Vice President shall be eligible to serve two consecutive two year terms (four years total each), while the secretary and treasurer are eligible to serve three consecutive two year terms (six years total).

At the Special Congregational Constitution Changes Meeting Vote #2, held January 28, 2024, a council approved revision of C11.02 was presented. It was not voted on because it had not been presented/distributed to the congregation in the time frame that the constitution requires. It was shared as informational only, to be voted on at the Midyear meeting.

The revised wording of C11.02 is as follows: "The President and Vice President shall be eligible to serve one two year term plus an additional year added consecutively to the term (three years total each), while the Secretary and Treasurer are eligible to serve three consecutive two year terms (six years total). This election shall occur during the first General Meeting of the calendar year. Their term of office shall begin twenty-four hours following their election. No officer shall hold more than one office at a time."

Also necessary to keep items in the constitution consistent and not redundant, C11.03 will be deleted, and C11.04 will become C11.03.

All these changes are recommended by the current church council.

This announcement is presented to the congregation to ensure conformity with C17.01 ".....The council shall notify this congregation's membership of the proposal with their recommendations at least thirty days in advance of the meeting."
