PASTOR'S PAGE—SPRINGTIME

Last month, I walked every day by a colorful blue pot near our front porch. I saw something growing in the blue pot every day. I watched the "tete-a-tete" (miniature daffodils) come to full bloom. It was great fun to see the tulips slowly break open. The flowers I saw growing in that pot were indicative of what was occurring. Spring had sprung! The death of winter gives way to birth.

This daily sighting enriched my Lenten journey. Every day the growth in this little pot spoke volumes to me about the nature of Christian life. I was buoyed by that growth and began praying that I grow a little bit every day.

Just as the seed is born to die for the sake of a more plentiful life, so our new birth at baptism initiates a life long journey of death giving way to life.

Luther described it as dying and rising every day.

Thus the Christian life is nothing else than a daily baptism, begun once and continuing forever ... let all Christians regard their baptism as the daily garment that they are to wear all the time. Every day they should be found in faith and with its fruits, suppressing the old creature and growing up in the new.

It is no small wonder that early Christians called springtime Lent. The word means springtime. Our preparation for Easter is marked by an openness to God who brings life out of death. Now Holy Week has begun. Holy Week preceded by Lent alone has the potential to move hearts and souls to rebirth and newness of life.

For me, this new life began the first day I started pastoring at First Lutheran Church of West Seattle. I believe that God has brought us together in this time of dying and rising, to place us on a journey of walking with Christ as we discern what ministry in West Seattle looks like in the days to come.

It is a great honor to be here among you and to follow Pastor Ron Marshall, who left a legacy of rich pastoral care, astute theological thinking, rich teaching and preaching, and served the whole church well with a critique intended to always bring the church back to the foot of the cross.

Thank you for your warm welcome and the opportunity to serve. As we take this Holy Week walk, I look forward to celebrating Easter and the chance to celebrate the feast with you.

In these days of Holy Week where we experience anew the great days of Christ's passion, death, and resurrection, we do a deep dive into the gracious and merciful heart of God.

May this be our dwelling place every day.


PRESIDENT'S REPORT

STEWARDSHIP

How Much and to Whom

A study of the Ten Commandments notes that the first three commandments pertain to our relationship with God: that we should fear, love, and trust in God above all things.

The remaining commandments pertain to "others," that is, that we should fear and love God so that we honor him in our relationships with parents, spouse, and neighbors in need.

Regarding Stewardship, we honor God, by returning a tithe of the benefit of our labors. We do this through the church, which is the body of Christ, a place of teaching, and preaching the Word of God, in a place for the administration of the Holy Sacraments.

Is there such an index for stewardship for neighbors in need? May I suggest a tithe of what we spend for groceries and eating out as an index of what we should contribute to the food bank, and other charities that provide groceries for those in need (Mt 25:40).

Extending this discussion, a tithe of what we spend for travel, recreation, and vacations might be a good index of what we contribute to agencies such as the Compass Housing Alliance, World Vision, the International Rescue Committee, Mary's place, etc., agencies that serve those who cannot afford such extras (Mt 25:40).

We will have to give God an account of our stewardship (Mt 25:14-30, 31-46). Will we be able to say that, in spite of our sins, the commandments and Jesus guided us?

Holy Week at First

The annual Christian journey of Holy Week began with the procession of palms and the reading of the Passion from Mark's Gospel. The sacred Three Days, what Augustine termed the "Triduum" of Christ's passion, death and resurrection begins with the Maundy Thursday evening service. On the night he was betrayed, Jesus established the meal of the Eucharist, washed his disciples' feet, and gave us the greatest commandment of all, to love God with our whole hearts, and our neighbors as ourselves. The depth of God's love begins to be revealed to us in a special way during the solemn stripping of the altar.

We leave in silence.

We gather on Good Friday to hear the Passion of Jesus from John's Gospel. The passion reading is embellished with sacred music and hymnody. This is a day set aside for prayer and to ponder again the depths of God's love in Christ.

We leave again in silence.

Holy Saturday is an in-between time. Between Good Friday and Easter we find ourselves in a liminal space of having been touched again by God's dying love while we anticipate the joy of the Resurrection. (Many Christians gather on Easter Eve to celebrate the Great Easter Vigil. At First we will celebrate it again next year.)

On Easter Sunday the "alleluia" is recovered. We sing and shout "Christ is risen!" Once again, God surprises us with new life. So, we pull out all the stops and celebrate with great joy.

We do not leave in silence but we do segue into a fifty day celebration.

The season of Easter, often referred to as the Great Fifty Days, is seen as one continuous feast beginning on Easter day and culminating on the day of Pentecost.
