THE MESSAGE AND HYMNS OF ADVENT

The season of Advent begins on Sunday, December 3, 2023. The Church has traditionally seen the season as a time of penitential preparation for the coming of Christ. Christ's coming has a threefold character, including his coming in history as a child in Bethlehem, his coming into the individual believer's heart and life, and his coming again at the end of time. The primary New Testament messenger of the coming of Christ in Bethlehem is John the Baptist, the focus of two of the gospel readings each Advent.

There may be no time of the church year with a richer selection of hymns in *Lutheran Book of Worship* than the season of Advent. We sing almost all of these seventeen Advent hymns in our congregation each year. Four hymns are worthy of special consideration for their emphasis on one of the three aspects of Christ's coming and on the season's primary messenger.

Oh, Come, Oh, Come, Emmanuel (LBW 34) is probably the best known hymn of the Advent season. It is based on a series of seven antiphons for the days before Christmas dating from about the ninth century, each beginning with an "O." Sometime in the thirteenth century five of these were selected for this hymn, focusing on Christ's coming at Bethlehem and referencing the Messiah's scriptural titles: Emmanuel (Isaiah 7:14), Lord of might (Exodus 3:15), Branch of Jesse (Isaiah 11:10), Dayspring (Malachai 4:2), and Key of David (Isaiah 22:22). Each verse concludes, "Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel."

O Lord, How Shall I Meet You (LBW 23), by the great seventeenth century German Lutheran pastor and poet Paul Gerhardt, focuses more on the coming of Christ into the heart of the individual believer. After asking how we are to prepare, it prays in verse one, "Oh, kindle, Lord most holy, your lamp within my breast to do in spirit lowly all that may please you best." In verse three we hear, "Love caused your incarnation; love brought you down to me. Your thirst for my salvation procured my liberty," followed in verse five with, "Rejoice, then, you sad-hearted...Despair not; he is near you, there, standing at the door," concluding in verse six, "He comes to judge the nations, a terror to his foes, a light of consolations and blessed hope to those who love the Lord's appearing, O glorious Sun, now come, send forth your beams so cheering and guide us safely home."

Christ's coming at the end of time is the focus of *Lo! He Comes with Clouds Descending (LBW* 27). Poet Charles Wesley wrote the text based on Revelation 1:7, "Look! He is coming with the clouds; every eye will see him, even those who pierced him; and on his account all the tribes of the earth will wail. So it is to be. Amen." (NRSV) It is paired with a majestic eighteenth century tune by Thomas Olivers.

On Jordan's Banks the Baptist's Cry (LBW 36) is based on the witness of John the Baptist. Charles Coffin's eighteenth century Latin text was translated into English in the nineteenth century by English clergyman John Chandler. It includes John the Baptist's calls to, "Awake and hearken" and, "Then cleansed be ev'ry life from sin; make straight the way for God within." echoing the prophet Isaiah.

May your faith be strengthened as we gather together in worship this Advent, sing these great hymns of the season, and prepare our hearts for the coming of Christ.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT



"Comfort ye, comfort ye my people, saith your God. Speak ye comfortably to Jerusalem, and cry unto her, that her warfare is accomplished, that her iniquity is pardoned. The voice of him that crieth in the wilderness, Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God." (Isaiah 40, vv.1–3)

The season of Advent starts on December 3rd, and is a period of preparation by prayer, fasting and penitence, as we await the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ at Christmas. Like Lent, the season leading up to Easter, Advent is a time of reflection and self-denial.

2023 budget update: Some members gave their pledges for the entire year at the beginning of 2023, giving us a strong start to the year. However, as the year has progressed, our general giving has fallen short. If you have not met your pledge for the 2023 budget, please make every effort to get caught up during the month of December. If you are caught up on your pledge, please consider making an extra year-end gift.

2024 pledge card update: At our December council meeting we will be working to establish our 2024 budget. If you have not turned in your pledge card, please do so as soon as possible. Your pledge card helps us to determine an accurate budget. As of this writing 19 pledge cards of the 30 distributed have been returned. Please prayerfully consider your pledge. Your generous support of our church will help in many ways, but particularly in this season of calling a permanent pastor it is vital to the future health of our church. Simply put, we will need to see an increase in pledged giving in order to fund the permanent pastor position.

Constitution updates: We met at a special congregational meeting on November 19th for the first of two votes to amend our constitution. There were three motions that covered topics including changing wording from "legally" to "properly", combining some committees and general changes. One of the more significant changes was to decrease our council size from nine general members to six. The council felt these changes would better reflect the work that we do and streamline committee work. The second meeting will be to ratify only the constitution changes, which needs two votes. The bylaws needed one vote, which was accomplished at our November meeting.

As the year comes to a close, I am grateful to the many people who serve the needs of our church and community. I am thankful that we have had such faithful preaching from our supply pastors over this past year. Our coffee hours have offered a welcome opportunity for fellowship with one another and with visitors to our church. May God bless you during this Advent and Christmas season.

In the first half of November the church council affirmed the call committee's decision to name the Rev. Dr. Bryon Hansen as our candidate of choice. We are pleased that he accepted the continuation of the call process. Rev. Hansen grew up in Western Washington, and is a pastor in the ELCA, ordained in 1986. He has served congregations in Troy and Deary, Idaho; Florence and Portland, Oregon; Auburn, California; and Seattle, Washington. He went to Western for his undergrad and received his MDiv from Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary in Berkley. In 2013 he received his Doctorate from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago.

Over the next few months, the congregation will be invited for a series of gatherings to meet the candidate, and for the candidate to get to know us. Rev. Hansen will also preside over services so we can have an opportunity to hear the Word from the candidate.

If all goes as planned, the congregation will then meet and formally vote on extending the call to the candidate. A two thirds majority is required to extend the call. The candidate then has 30 days to accept the call or refuse the call. We are hoping to that by Lent we will have a new permanent Pastor for First Lutheran. Thanks be to God!


Each Sunday in Advent, we light an additional candle. Some years we try for nightly devotionals with
