MARTIN LUTHER'S HYMNS FOR CHRISTMAS AND EPIPHANY

In these days, we continue to celebrate the glorious twelve days of Christmas, from the Feast of the Nativity of Our Lord on December 25 through the twelfth day on January 5. On January 6, the Church remembers the Epiphany of Our Lord, the first day of the season extending through the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday. The word Epiphany comes from the Greek *epiphaneia*, meaning "manifestation" or "showing forth." In the Western Church, the season traditionally recalls three events by which Christ is made manifest as the Son of God following those of his birth: at the arrival of the Magi at "the house" (Matthew 2:1-12), contrary to the common lore of them worshipping him at the manger; at his baptism by John the Baptist in the river Jordan, where he was revealed as God's Son by a voice from heaven (recorded or mentioned in all four Gospels); and at the wedding at Cana where he changed water into wine, his first miracle or sign (John 2:1-11).

Martin Luther provided hymns for many of the seasons and major feasts of the church year, in an effort to clearly proclaim the Gospel in and through these foundational events. He wrote two hymns for Christmas. The best known of these is *From Heaven Above to Earth I Come* (*LBW* 51), written in 1535 for his family's Christmas Eve celebration. Over 14 verses, it combines the angels' announcement of the birth of Jesus, the shepherds' visit to the manger, and the believer's response to, "what God for us has done in sending us his own dear Son." Published in 1539 together with the text, the melody is generally also thought to be by Luther. His other Christmas hymn, *All Praise to You, Eternal Lord* (*LBW* 48), is not widely known. The first verse was borrowed from a late 14th century Latin Christmas hymn, to which Luther added six verses of his own, published in 1524. The original version ended each stanza with "Kyrieleis," a common rendering of "Kyrie eleison" (Lord have mercy). The *LBW* version has five verses, each ending with "Hallejuah" rather than the original "Kyrieleis." The melody appeared with the text in 1524, though it's composer is unknown.

For many years the carol Away in a Manger (LBW 67) was commonly attributed to Luther, but is actually of 19th century American origin.

To Jordan Came the Christ, Our Lord (LBW 79) recalls the second and most important of the three manifestations of Christ in the Epiphany season, his baptism by John the Baptist at the river Jordan. Published in 1541, it includes the key elements of the event in response to his Father's will. "This heavenly washing now shall be a cleansing from transgression and, by his blood and agony, release from death's oppression. A new life awaits us."

The twelve days of Christmas begin with the Feast of the Nativity on December 25th and end on January 5th. This is a time of celebration as we recognize the anniversary of the birth of Jesus Christ. January 7th marks the first Sunday of the Epiphany season. On this day we observe the baptism of our lord.

Pastor update: Pastor Bryon Hansen is officially our candidate of choice for permanent pastor of FLCWS. While this in itself can be a lengthy process, we are happy to offer an opportunity for the congregation to gather with him on Sunday, January 7th, to meet him and get to know him. Additional information is included in the Call Committee report in this newsletter.

2024 budget update: At our December council meeting we began working on our 2024 budget. Thanks to your dedication, we received many additional pledge cards. Your generous support of our church helps in many ways, but particularly during the call process of a permanent pastor. We plan to finalize the budget in January and will have it available to vote on at our annual meeting. As of this writing it is a tight budget, but do-able.

One of the challenging items to our budget is the necessary work on the parsonage. I'd like to thank the many individuals who have volunteered time, supplies, designated giving and all-out physical labor to get the parsonage to where it is today. By late January we hope to have the kitchen upgrades, bathroom upgrades, finishing work, electrical work and flooring complete. The plan is to hire a property management team to rent the parsonage to an individual or family in the community. The income from the parsonage will help us to increase income to offset costs within our budget.

Constitution updates: In follow up to the November congregation meeting to update the constitution, the second meeting will be to ratify only the constitution changes, which need two votes. This meeting will occur immediately following the 10:30 am Liturgy on Sunday, January 28th. The bylaws needed one vote, which was accomplished at our November meeting. Immediately following the constitution meeting, we will be holding our annual meeting. Please plan to attend both of these events in the Parish Hall.

Almighty God, you have filled us with the new light of the Word who became flesh and lived among us. Let the light of our faith shine in all that we do, through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

CALL COMMITTEE

First an apology; my published timeline for the next steps of the call process was incorrect. After consultation with committee members, staff, and the candidate we developed a new road map of having two meet and greet sessions, a small number of pulpit supply appearances and having a separate congregation meeting in February for the actual vote.

In early December the candidate met with the staff and took a formal tour of the building.

We would like to invite the congregation to meet Rev. Hansen for a small plate lunch on January 7th in the Parish Hall and then again for lighter fare on February 4th in rooms C and D. These events will replace our monthly congregational coffee fellowship gatherings for January and February.

We are keeping the annual meeting separate from the call vote meeting. The call vote will occur on February 11th after the service. That is Superbowl Sunday, but the game doesn't start until 3:30 pm PST. The candidate would then have 30 days to accept the call. The formal installation would occur after Easter. The called Pastor could assume the position after the call is accepted, but before the investiture.

PARSONAGE REPORT

The parsonage renovations will continue on into early 2024. Demolition of the kitchen flooring had occurred during the fall. The Parsonage committee began seeking bid quotes from contractors to complete the following items: soffit relocation, flooring install, purchased kitchen cabinet installation, counter top installation, and painting. Construction materials, such as the flooring, counter tops and appliances, were agreed to be purchased separate from the labor quotes.

On December 12, 2023, the church council voted and agreed to authorize \$35K towards this phase of the parsonage renovations. It was decided during that council meeting that the contractor bid to move forward with was Kris Sagmoen. Kris intends to begin his work on Tuesday December 19, 2023. The contractor work is expected to last 3 weeks. Following Kris's work, next for the parsonage will be carpet replacement quotes and installation scheduling, punch list walkthrough, and finishing touches.

The parsonage committee hopes to have the parsonage completed by early 2024.

In Matthew 3:15 Jesus tells John to baptize him in order "to fulfill all righteousness." Luther teaches:

As though it were not enough that Christ Himself submitted to Baptism, ... as soon as he comes out of the water, the whole heaven opens up so that the divine Majesty comes down and appears visibly. Although it is told simply, it is certainly the greatest sign and most glorious revelation ever heard or seen. Here God actually shows Himself.... All three persons of the Godhead.... (Luther's Works 57:163)
