Pilgrimage

Chances are that you are reading this issue of the *Messenger* while I am away. Along with Britt and another pastor, I am leading a Civil Rights Pilgrimage from October 1st through 9th. The inspiration for this journey came from a Sabbatical we took a few years ago that included travel in the American South. There we explored places that figured prominently in the civil rights era and people with unique perspectives of being impacted by the civil rights movement and those who are continuing the unfinished task of racial justice.

The journey begins in Atlanta and continues through Selma, Montgomery, Birmingham, and concludes in Memphis. We will visit places where history was made and places that tell the story of what has been and offer inspiration for what yet may be. All 39 of us will have opportunity to debrief our experience with each other and pray together.

Note that this journey is described not as a tour or a trip, but a pilgrimage. That's with intention. Going back to ancient times, Christians have made pilgrimages as part of their faith journey. Pilgrims traveled to the Holy Land in the fourth century and later visited Rome and other places associated with the apostles, saints, and martyrs. Through the centuries, thousands of places have been and continue to be destination places for pilgrims. The purpose of these pilgrimages is more than piquing historical interest. They are fresh encounters with God. Just so, we pray this pilgrimage to be an opportunity to step outside of ourselves and meet Christ anew.

I like the description of pilgrimage from Brother James Koester, abbot of the Society of St. John in Cambridge, Massachusetts: "Pilgrims aren't going places to simply see the sites. Pilgrims go to be surprised by God, and to discover a bond with other pilgrims. But you don't have to travel thousands of miles to be a pilgrim to be surprised by God. You only have to be a pilgrim and you can be that, right here and now, by opening yourself up to the power and presence of God"


May God bless us in our endeavors together.

STEWARDSHIP

Galatians 6: 6-10 Supporting the Pastor and the Body of the Church

As fall begins the rain returns to the Pacific Northwest. The parched earth receives the gift of rain, the harvest is brought in, and we are thankful for His bounty. My mind immediately goes to Proverbs 3:9-10 and how we are to present the "first fruits" to honor the Lord. As my mind drifts, I am once again thankful that it is not my sacrifice that is the measure of my salvation but by my baptism and the sacrifice of Christ that I am saved. Thanks be to God.

Even though tithing and giving to the Lord what is already His has been around since Genesis 14, it appears as commands in the Books of Moses and again throughout the Old Testament, I found myself reading the sixth chapter of the Epistle of Paul to the Galatians.

Let the one who is taught the word share all good things with the one who teaches. Do not be deceived: God is not mocked, for whatever one sows, that will he also reap. For the one who sows to his own flesh will from the flesh reap corruption, but the one who sows to the Spirit will from the Spirit reap eternal life. And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up. So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith. Galatians 6: 6-10 (ESV)

Here we, as a people who have heard the Word, are charged with giving to the church to support our pastor. We should be grateful for the great gifts of salvation and thus give generously, so we can continue to hear the Word but also so it can be heard by others as a part of the Great Commission. The Word needs to be heard, and thankfully at our parish the Word comes from a called preacher.

When we called Pastor Hansen, we were unable to support a full-time pastor's salary. We are not alone. Many churches, as they dwindle in numbers or as costs rise, reduce the scope of their pastoral care or close outright. Many candidates who in years past would have gone into the ministry don't for financial reasons. Many leave the ministry. Unfortunately, this is not a new thing, Martin Luther in his commentary on Galatians expressed it this way,

"When Satan cannot suppress the preaching of the Gospel by force, he tries to accomplish his purpose by striking the ministers of the Gospel with poverty. He curtails their income to such an extent that they are forced out of the ministry because they cannot live by the Gospel. Without ministers to proclaim the Word of God the people go wild like savage beasts."

We should strive by increased membership and increased giving to re-establish a fulltime pastoral position. We should strive so that just compensation is given to those who tend His flock.

It is not all about the pastor. The staff needs to be compensated for their tireless efforts. The church needs funds to function so that the Word can be heard in a manner that we agreed to in our mission statement. We will also be hiring a new organist. We were blessed with the amazing gifts and talents of Andrew King for many years. We will not be able to replace his dedication to First Lutheran and to the faith, but if we wish to have anywhere near similar quality of organist candidates, we as a congregation should expect to pay for those musical talents. That will need to come from increased giving.

As Paul continues in his letter we are called to "do good to everyone". Our parish support of El Camino de Emaus, the Compass Center, Lutheran World Relief, and the West Seattle Food Bank, among others, relies on our giving back His gifts.

So as the rains come, please consider turning away from "sowing earthy things" and increase your support for our parish and the Holy Church so that we and others can "reap from the Spirit"!



MEMORIAL SERVICE for ANDREW JAMES KING

Saturday, October 19th, 1:00 p.m.



Andy King touched the lives of many people both within and outside this congregation. He was well known and respected among his musical peers and at FLCWS. Andy has been the organist/cantor at FLCWS for 50 years. Larraine and Andy have been very dedicated to Christ and the ministry of FLCWS. Children David and Elizabeth were formed in this community, including the praise of God in song through the children's choir and chancel choir. Andy left his imprint in many ways at First Lutheran. Besides his immense musical talents, he and Larraine have been very active in all aspects of parish life. Through his words and deeds, Andy has had a tremendous influence on the lives of many in our congregation. Prelude music begins at 12:30. The funeral liturgy will begin at 1:00 p.m. in the sanctuary, and will conclude with the inurnment in the Chapel of the Resurrection. A reception will follow in the Fellowship Hall.

EL CAMINO DE EMAUS UPDATE

On October 1, Rev. Zulma Tifre becomes the half-time interim pastor at El Camino de Emaus in Burlington, WA for the coming year (contracted through July 2025). Pr. Tifre has been doing pulpit supply for three out of four Sundays since March. This half-time call expands her ministry with the congregation. She will offer leadership on Sundays and also work on outreach, pastoral care and administration. She is the ordained pastor of First United Methodist Church of Mount Vernon. This ecumenical synergy is being made possible through the help of Rev. Charis Weathers from Burlington Lutheran, who will mentor Pr. Tifre in ELCA practices. Burlington Lutheran has been a long-time partner parish with El Camino.



In other El Camino news, two El Camino members were able to attend Gethsemane Lutheran in Seattle on August 18 for worship, lunch, and conversation about Hispanic ministries in our Synod. They were delighted to be part of their bilingual service led jointly by Pr. Salvador Cossio of Grace Lutheran in Des Moines and Pr Joanne Engquist of Gethsemane. It was particularly interesting to learn that Gethsemane started 140 years ago as a Swedish-only service and now enjoys great diversity, and heartwarming to hear that Gethsemane would enjoy joining an El Camino service in the future. First Lutheran also has long history of supporting El Camino's ministry, and part of the offerings received at Pr. Bryon's investiture were shared there.

UPCOMING FESTIVALS

Reformation Sunday, October 27

This month we celebrate the Festival of the Reformation on October 27, the Sunday nearest October 31 when Martin Luther posted the 95 Theses on the door of the Wittenberg castle church door in 1517. This event symbolizes the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. On this day we give thanks for this witness and we view it as a call for continuing church reform. *Ecclesia semper reformanda est:* the church is always in need of reform.

Gracious Father, we pray for your holy catholic church. Fill it with all truth and peace. Where it is corrupt, purify it; where it is in error, direct it; where in anything amiss, reform it; where it is right, strengthen it; where it is in need, provide for it; where it is divided, reunite it; for the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. All Saints Sunday, November 3



On All Saints Day, November 1, the church commemorates all Christians who have died, both the famous and forgotten. Particular saints are remembered on the day of their death. This day encapsulates all Christians who have been commended to God's everlasting care. Not all saints are alike. Spiritual gifts are various. Some may have mystical experiences; other do not. Some are busy working in the world while other saints do not have the energy for that. One saint may uphold
