

#### PASTOR'S PAGE — Making and Keeping Promises

I've never been one to keep New Year's resolutions. I have made resolutions more times than I can count. For me, making resolutions is the easy part. Keeping them is another story altogether. I admire those who can keep them. My track records isn't so great. I often have good and even grand ideas about how my life should improve. I have vowed to put these ideas into action, but for me, keeping resolutions usually has a brief shelf life.

I suspect there are many reasons for this, not the least of which is a tendency to have high expectations for myself and others, but the higher the goal or ideal, the quicker it falls. I'm still on a learning curve when it comes to keeping goals simple and realistic.

Over the years, I've come to appreciate the Feast of the Baptism of our Lord, always celebrated on the first Sunday after Epiphany. The Baptism of our Lord is a time for all of us to remember and renew our baptism into Christ. When we are asked to recommit to the baptismal promises, it like entering the New Year with a fresh start in nothing less than the mercy and grace of God.

The promises we renew from time to time are the same ones an individual makes when affirming their baptism:

To live among God's faithful people To hear God's Word and share in the Lord's Supper To proclaim the good news of God in Christ in word and deed To serve all people following the example of Jesus To strive for justice and peace in all the earth

These promises are a rich description of the Christian life. We could approach them as another set of resolutions, but I am afraid that such an approach would be futile. For many of us, their destiny would not be unlike the other kinds of resolutions we endeavor to make and keep.

Rather than a set of resolutions, we can approach God's newness by saying "yes" to these promises by seeing them not as high goals but as a continual Spirit driven turn to God. We ask God to help us keep these promises. They are not fueled by our abilities. God is active and alive in all of them. We don't have to make them up! And God joins us to the community called church where we are free to share life in Christ, not as those who keep perfect resolutions but just as we are, dependent on God's forgiveness and mercy to live in the freedom of the Gospel.

On January 12 we will renew these promises again at worship. That very day we also begin a series of adult formation sessions to explore the baptismal promises. When we respond to the questions about our intention to live in this covenant relationship given to us by God, we say, "Yes, and we ask God to help us guide us."

Asking God to help and guide us makes all the difference.

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Wishing you all a Happy New Year! Our congregation experienced many transitions this past year. I hope that we can settle into our processes and build upon momentum.

First up is the 2025 Annual Meeting and Report, which will be held on Sunday, January 26, 2025, following the 10:30 AM liturgy. At our Mid-Year Congregational Meeting in July, the congregation passed the initial vote needed for the constitutional change then. The second and final vote will be held in a separate special session just prior to the Annual Meeting.



As previously written in the June 2024 Messenger, here is a recap of the proposed changes:

The original wording for C11.02 is as follows: "The officers shall be elected by the congregation and shall serve for two years. This election shall occur during the first General Meeting of the calendar year. Their term of office shall begin twenty-four hours following their election."

The proposed wording of C11.02 that failed to receive a majority is as follows: "The president and vice president shall be elected by the congregation and may serve two consecutive, two year terms. This election shall occur during the first General Meeting of the calendar year. Their term of office shall begin twenty-four hours following their election. No officer shall hold more than one office at a time. The President and Vice President shall be eligible to serve two consecutive two year terms (four years total each), while the secretary and treasurer are eligible to serve three consecutive two year terms (six years total).

At the Special Congregational Constitution Changes Meeting Vote #2, held January 28, 2024, a council approved revision of C11.02 was presented. It was not voted on because it had not been presented/distributed to the congregation in the time frame that the constitution requires. It was shared as informational only, to be voted on at the Midyear meeting.

The revised wording of C11.02 is as follows: "The President and Vice President shall be eligible to serve one two year term plus an additional year added consecutively to the term (three years total each), while the Secretary and Treasurer are eligible to serve three consecutive two year terms (six years total). This election shall occur during the first General Meeting of the calendar year. Their term of office shall begin twenty-four hours following their election. No officer shall hold more than one office at a time."

Also necessary to keep items in the constitution consistent and not redundant, C11.03 will be deleted, and C11.04 will become C11.03. The congregation was notified of the proposed changes 30 days in advance back in June of 2024 prior to the Mid-Year Congregational meeting.

I hope everyone had a joyous Christmas season. Many thanks for our relationships, generous gifts, and blessings upon our church. May we continue to increase our financial support for the church's future. May we continue to grow in our steadfast faith.


