HOLY WEEK

Holy Week begins on Palm/Passion Sunday. The purple color of Lent becomes scarlet as we enter into contemplating Christ's passion. On Palm/Passion Sunday we read the Passion. This year we read from the Gospel of Luke. The liturgy begins with the procession of palms recalling Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. There are prayers and scripture readings appointed for Holy Week. We will hold a simple evening prayer service in the Chapel on Tuesday and Wednesday of Holy Week.

The primary focus of the week is the Great Three Days. St. Augustine named it the "Triduum" in which Jesus suffered, died, and was raised. The great three days begin at the Maundy Thursday evening service when Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper, continues on Good Friday when Jesus died, and reaches its climax at the Easter Vigil when the story of God's saving works are told, new Christians are welcomed through Baptism and new members received, and we feast on the bread of life and cup of blessing. This celebration spills over into Easter Sunday, continuing the feast of Christ's triumph over death.

There is a tendency to approach these sacred days as merely recalling what happened a long time ago. We do remember, but the greater truth is that Christ is actively present in these days, touching us with mercy and grace. It is indeed the Risen Christ who feeds us at the table, stoops to wash our feet, reigns victorious on the Cross, and brings the light that the darkness cannot overcome.

The three days are actually ONE liturgy. What begins on Maundy Thursday continues on Good Friday, the Easter Vigil, and Easter Sunday. The services over the three days are considered one because the death and resurrection of Christ cannot be separated. Together, they are one saving mystery. Take this opportunity to be present for all three days to experience anew the saving love of God.

COFFEE FELLOWSHIP: Join us in the lounge every Sunday after the service.


