Pastor's Page - Easter

Mystagogy. It is not an everyday word, but it is the best word to describe the season of Easter. Mystagogy means "study of the mysteries." The lectionary readings and themes of Easter derive from this ancient practice.

By the 4th century, many churches practiced the adult catechumenate, the process leading up to their baptism. Over time, the process developed and Lent became the period of time to prepare for baptism at the Easter Vigil and the Fifty Days of Easter, considered one unitive feast, was a time for them to be schooled in the mysteries of Baptism and Eucharist with all of its accompanying signs and symbols. Early church teachers like Augustine or Ambrose would call to mind the events of the Easter Vigil and introduce a sustained reflection on these sacramental actions. The signs and wonders were tied to scripture and what it means to follow Jesus in daily life.

This was a deeply formative time, relying as much on the experience of the newly baptized as formal teaching. This year's ridings in Easter include a series of passages from Revelation which is itself a teeming with signs and symbols.

While we are not going back to the fourth century, (it's impossible and would be silly) preaching during the several weeks of Easter becomes the opportunity to reflect on the signs and symbols of the liturgy and sacraments. It is one way in which ancient practice contributes to current practice.

Enjoy the 50 days of Easter that culminate of Pentecost. Bring full attention to the sights, sounds, actions, and gestures of worship. What do these things alongside the scripture readings proclaim about the Risen Christ? How does Christ show up in and through them? What is the connection between the wonders of worship and our daily ministry of following Jesus?

An ancient church father once remarked that what was conspicuous in the Savior Jesus is now seen and known in the sacraments.

I pray this season of Easter will be one of joy and blessing for us all. Let the Easter acclamation ring out: "Alleluia! Christ is risen. He is risen indeed!"

We will reflect on the Easter Vigil and consider using our gifts for ministry in daily life and a deeper involvement in the congregation.

SICK LEAVE: Pastor Hansen will have surgery on May 12. This will be a second surgery on his right foot to replace the hardware is coming apart. While this surgery is not as extensive as the first, the recovery time is the same. He will be taking medical leave for six weeks, the amount of time when non-weight bearing is required. Pastor will be working through May 11. Pastor Phil Nesvig will be presiding and preaching for the rest May and early June. Pastor Ivar Hillesland will preside and preach on Pentecost, June 8th. Topping the agenda is the election of bishop. Our current bishop may be re-elected or another person elected, depending upon the number of votes cast. Besides our current bishop Rev. Shelley Bryan Wee, another pastor has identified as a candidate, Rev. Priscilla Austin from Immanuel Lutheran Church in Seattle. According to the ecclesiastical ballot, any pastor may be nominated for the first ballot.

STEWARDSHIP

As we are heading into the spring and summer months, we are a bit behind budget on giving. I would ask everyone to consider their efforts in giving, and work towards a full tithe. Hopefully we can close the gap to budget over the next few months.

Tithing is frequently mentioned in scriptures (Genesis 28:20-22, Leviticus 27:30, Deuteronomy 14:22, Malachi 3:8-10) and serves many purposes. Here are just a few reasons to financially support the church and work towards a full tithe:

- 1. Spiritual discipline giving away a portion of our resources reminds us that God is our provider; all we have is a blessing from Him and we need to put our trust in Him.
- 2. Financial discipline making a commitment to give away part of what you receive may cause you to more closely monitor how you spend your money and improve your stewardship in all things.
- 3. Maintenance and care for our facilities we have a beautiful facility, and besides the general expenses for the day-to-day operation, there are many maintenance costs (some that are not always obvious) that are necessary to keep the facility in a state of proper repair.
- 4. Source of livelihood for our staff we have a talented and hardworking staff who deserves more than we are able to compensate them. At a minimum, we need to meet our commitments for their compensation.
- 5. Providing support for those in need through our Extended Ministries programs, we support efforts to aid our neighbors in need.
- 6. Thanksgiving we have much to be thankful for at FLCWS. The quality of our worship service, the preaching, the music, the teaching, and the fellowship all work together to keep our hearts in the right place giving thanks for the promise of mercy that we have inherited through our faith in Jesus Christ.

Please prayerfully consider all these things when planning your giving over the summer and throughout the year. And thank you for your support of the church.

FEDERAL FUNDING HAS BEEN CUT OFF FOR FOOD BANKS & SCHOOLS!

In March the USDA announced the immediate termination of the Local Food for Schools (LFS) program and the Local Food Purchase Assistance (LFPA) program, cutting \$1 Billion that supported school meals and food banks.

This means that the money the West Seattle Food Bank and West Seattle schools had to buy fresh local produce is gone. It also means that farmers in our region who grow produce have lost a significant market and source of income.

The West Seattle Food Bank has some suggestions on how we can help:

Support WSFB's <u>Backpack Program</u> & <u>Fresh Food Fund</u>. The Food Bank will experience an increased demand for weekend food backpacks and fresh produce. They will also experience increased demand for summer lunches when schools and lunchrooms go on summer vacation. [We can donate money to help with this.]

Buy LOCAL and advocate for Farm-to Table Programs

Support farmers who lost funding by shopping at farmer's markets, joining a CSA, or encouraging local businesses to source from regional farms. Buying locally grown produce will help area farmers recover.

Contact state legislators and advocate for increased state funding to keep kids fed regardless of shifting USDA policies.

Consider volunteering at the Food Bank.

Donate funds to the West Seattle Food Bank or through your church offering.

Check the Extended Ministries bulletin board in the hall to find out what the Food Bank needs and donate via the church collection box in room C.
