#### Pastor's Page — Thanksgiving

Sarah Josepha Hale had a dream. Hale was a writer, poet and editor of the popular American Ladies Magazine. She penned the children's nursery rhyme, "Mary had a little lamb." Her dream was for the nation to enjoy a national thanksgiving holiday not unlike the ones she was accustomed to in her native New England. She lobbied hard for federal officials to make this happen believing that such a holiday would serve a unifying purpose to "help heal the wounds of the nation." She wrote letters to four U.S. Presidents. They did not respond. Finally, she wrote to a fifth president who took her advice. In 1863, President Lincoln declared the first ever American Thanksgiving holiday.

Lincoln was inspired by Sarah Hale's dream and believed that such a special day might ease tensions in a divided nation. He declared Thanksgiving an annual holiday to take place on the third Thursday of November. This declaration took effect during a bloody civil war.

I don't think the holiday ever had the unifying effect intended for the nation but maybe it has served that purpose for any number of families or communities. Still, people drawn together around a full dinner table at harvest time can be healing balm. Though our hearts are not inclined to such things in the midst of a civil war or strife, giving thanks directs our hearts to the one

who still provides and is with us in our strife.

As Christians, we know this to be true. We know it is right to give thanks, as we pray each Sunday "at all times and in all places." Gratitude is in our faith DNA. So, each week we set our thanksgiving table with bread and wine trusting that at the Eucharist, Jesus draws us to himself and makes us one.

November is a good month to engage more deeply into the practice of giving thanks. Consider what you are grateful for and ask God to give you the vision to live in gratitude.

Gail Ramshaw writes that thanksgiving draws us not only to a shared meal but "in two other directions as well. One is to the triune God, the Bread who is God, the first fruit who is the resurrection of Christ, the fields of mown grain that is the Spirit in community. The second direction is toward all who suffer from lack of harvest we tend to take for granted. We do well to add a couplet to the traditional table prayer:

Come, Lord Jesus, be our guest, and let these gifts to us be blest. Blest be God, who is our Bread. May all the world be clothed and fed.

#### **STEWARDSHIP**

I always tried to pray for the spiritual, or the "important" stuff. I prayed for the oppressed, the sick, my family, my soul, and especially for forgiveness, things like that. Never in my life would I have thought that I would be seeking the Lord's guidance in writing a stewardship article. I worried that with my poor words alone, I would not be able to communicate to the congregation a message about the importance of stewardship of the church. Each week, as a congregation, we pray for the continued success of our parish. We pray with joy and thanksgiving for the gifts of God; everything that He created, including ourselves, our time, and our possessions. In this process, I was guided to Paul's second letter to the Corinthians and was soothed by the realization that this challenge I was having was nothing new. Read 2 Corinthians 8 and 9. Paul discusses with the church in Corinth, one which he founded, stewardship in the early Church. The chapters are not glamorous; they are oddly technical, and Paul is both stern and uses flattery. The chapters end with the more famous part about God loving a generous giver. However, taken together, both chapters made my experience relatable. Stewardship is needed for the Church to function, to spread the Word, and to help the needy...and Paul himself had to write a stewardship article. I am thankful for the task of writing this because the Spirit drew me once again to the Word.

As Pentecost winds down and the Church readies itself to begin a new year, it is also time to evaluate our own individual stewardship. The pledge cards are available and I encourage you to fill them out and turn them in. This simple act makes the budgeting process for next year go smoother. Over the past couple of years, the number of members who turn in a card has greatly diminished. In order to set a budget for the operation of our parish, we need to have the cards turned in.

Might I suggest three simple tasks for continued stewardship for this month for your peace of mind and for the continued success of our small church on a hill? First; please thank the Lord for His blessings and for our parish's achievements. Secondly, turn in your pledge cards so we can plan and be good stewards of the church's finances. Finally: say a prayer for the continued growth and well-being of the First Lutheran Church of West Seattle so that we may continue to live and act though our Lord and God.

#### DO YOU WANT TO HELP LEAD WORSHIP?

Here are some worship roles you may be interested in as ways to use your gifts. If one or more of these are of interest to you, please mark the appropriate box on the Sunday morning "Count Me In!" form and place in the offering plate. We will follow up with a training for each role. We will be promoting these roles throughout the month of November.

#### **Acolyte**

The word acolyte literally means "follower." He or she follows or assists the Presider. An acolyte lights candles and assists with various worship duties including carrying the processional cross and torches on feast days, and helping at the time of communion distribution. Very occasionally the acolyte will serve as a thurifer, assisting with the thurible carrying incense.

#### **Assisting Minister**

The assisting minister helps the presiding minister and serves the community at worship. He or she leads the intercessory prayers, the prayers before and after communion, and says the dismissal (Go in peace). On occasion, the assisting minister sings the Kyrie or the introductory lines for the Hymn of Praise. However, it is important to note that you need not be a singer to serve in this role. Those responsibilities may be sung by a cantor in the choir. The current role of Assisting Minister, introduced with the publication of the Lutheran Book of Worship in 1978, hearkens back to the traditional role of the Deacon, a conduit between the church and the world in need. The Assisting Minister is intentionally carried out by a person who is not an ordained pastor. Assisting Ministers represent the whole people of God gathered at worship to engage in prayer around God's Word and the Table.

#### Lector

A lector reads the scripture on Sunday. Currently, the lector reads both the Old Testament and New Testament reading and leads the psalm. The Gospel is normally read by the Presiding Minister and at times the Deacon. The task of a lector is to read the scripture publicly as a proclamation of Gods Word.

#### Choir

The choir is always looking for new members. The choir's primary role is to assist and support the gathered assembly in singing. The choir also sings anthems appropriate to the liturgical day and provides assistance with particular liturgical songs.

#### Ushers

The ushers greet people as they arrive for worship, hand them a worship bulletin, answer questions and assist visitors. In addition, ushers pass the offering plates and present the gifts at the offertory. They also guide people to the altar for communion. This is a ministry of hospitality.

#### The Office of Verger

The verger's roots are in the medieval monasteries of Europe, sharing similarities with the Minor Orders of Porter and Acolyte. They were responsible for the order and upkeep of the house of worship, including the church building, furnishings and sacred relics, preparations for liturgies, conduct of the laity and burial of the dead. This eventually spread beyond the monasteries and into the churches and cathedrals of Europe. In America, vergers are used in Episcopal Churches and Cathedrals. In other denominations, the work of the verger has been dispersed among a variety of service groups, i.e., acolytes, altar guilds, ushers and maintenance staff. At FLCWS, the Vergers' role is to assist at the worship services. Their function is to support and augment the Acolyte Guild whenever needed as acolyte, crucifer, torchbearer, bookbearer, bannerbearer, and assisting at Holy Baptism and Holy Communion, particularly at major festivals and other liturgical celebrations when a larger number of assistants are needed. FLCWS has a long tradition of honoring the historical liturgies, upholding the apostolic faith, practice, and seasons of the liturgical year. The Office of Verger enables us to continue in that long tradition of honoring the solemnity of our praise of God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

#### FESTIVALS IN NOVEMBER

All Saints Day will be celebrated November 2. The seeds for this celebration were sown in the second century when martyrs were com-



memorated on the anniversary of their death. In the fourth century, a single day was established to commemorate all the saints. Today, the church commemorates all deceased Christians, both the famous and forgotten, and celebrates the unity of the church on earth and the church in heaven. We will especially remember with thanksgiving these saints of First Lutheran Church of West Seattle who died in 2025: Mona Ayer

**Christ the King Sunday** will take place on November 23. This official closing out of the liturgical year is a relatively new festival. Pope Pius XI




instituted this feast in 1925 as a response to the growth of secular and non-Christian empires. This day celebrates the lordship of Christ. What makes Jesus so different than other rulers? Christ is a king who reigns from a cross.

#### **ADVENT**

Advent begins on November 30<sup>th</sup>. The season of Advent and a new liturgical year begins the last day of November. The Gospel for year A is Matthew. Contrasted to Mark and Luke, Jesus in Matthew's Gospel is a teacher of a "higher right-eousness" exceeding that of the Pharisees. In Matthew, Jesus is the wise sage who instructs his followers how to be a church together, blesses those whom the world discards, and commands us to make disciples and to teach them all that Jesus has taught us about life in the Kingdom of God. Advent begins, as usual, with a focus on the second coming of Christ, turning our focus on the promised day when the fullness of God's love will be all-in-all.
