Pastor's Page – Why pray?

Full disclosure. I am both a "news junkie" and a "political junkie." (I've been warned that this is a dangerous combination) Lately, however I've been failing to live up to these descriptions. Some days I have little or no desire to watch, listen or read the news. I've even abandoned some of my podcasts. This is not like me.

When I talk to some of my friends or acquaintances I realize that I'm not standing on this island alone. People are feeling discouraged and cynical about the nation's ills and its leadership. There is deep division and polarization in our nation. Instead of civility it has become permissible to demonize those who hold a different view and instead of the common good, it seems that politicians of every stripe are most loyal to political gain and power seeking. I find that reducing my intake of news makes me feel better but I'm keenly aware that burying my head in the sand is not a healthy option.

What is a person to do? More specifically, what is a Christian to do?

God calls us to pray and pray unceasingly. Last month, one of our Sunday scripture readings included this familiar passage: "I urge supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for everyone, for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity." (1 Timothy 2:1)

Each Sunday, in the intercessory prayers, we pretty much pray for everyone, including "kings and all who are in high positions." In other words, we pray for those in authority, the leaders of this nation and throughout the world that they may govern with justice and mercy. Sometimes we may wonder why we pray when it appears that nothing seems to change. Why pray if it doesn't seem to make any difference?

I think it's important to remember that prayer is no magic formula but an ongoing conversation with God. It's good to be bold in what we ask of God but we can't presume that God will be changed by our prayers. Still, we pray trusting that God is somehow mysteriously at work in the world. Naturally we wonder why prayers have not been answered and injustice continue. Prayer doesn't answer why but through prayer we can live in the world in spite of its ills. In spite of all our unanswered questions or frustrations, what we desire most is God. Prayer meets this desire.

We pray "thy kingdom come." Luther wrote that the kingdom of God comes on its own without our prayer but we pray that it will come to us. Said in a different way, we pray that our lives will bear witness to the good news that the Kingdom of God has broken into our troubled world.

Prayer changes us. We become channels of healing, justice, and love – the very things we pray for. Prayer and actions are two sides of the same coin. They depend upon each other.

We can bury our heads in the sand for only a while. At some point we must come up for air. Just so, Christ meets us in prayer and sends us into the world to be the change for which we long and for which we pray.

Written by George Frideric Handel in 1741, Messiah — and especially the Hallelujah Chorus — has become one of Western music's most widely performed and recognized pieces. St John the Baptist Episcopal Church is a welcoming and affirming community in West Seattle—and you are most certainly welcome here for this performance of choruses, solos, and instrumental music from Part I: The Birth of Jesus (+ a couple of additional numbers). Details on how to get involved follow.



Singers are invited to attend any (or all) totally optional rehearsals. Or, if you know it cold or want to wing it, just show up on November 21 for the fun. RSVP is requested but not required. Resources for learning the choruses will be provided ahead of time.

- Rehearsal 1 (optional): November 3 (6:30-8:00 PM)
- Rehearsal 2 (optional): November 9 (4:30-6:00 PM)
- Rehearsal 3 (optional): November 18 (6:30-8:00 PM)

Instrumentalists should learn their parts beforehand and plan to attend the single rehearsal. Handel's score calls for violin, viola, cello, bass, oboe, trumpet, timpani, and basso continuo (harpsichord, bassoon, portative organ). Mozart's arrangement expanded this to include clarinet, flute, and French horn. Our arrangement will include pretty much anyone who wants to show up—in the grand tradition of music throughout time, we'll use what we've got. If you come, we'll figure it out. RSVP is required.

Reformation Sunday is October 26th this year.
