PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I hope everyone's summer has gone well; the time seemed to have flown by. Thank you to all who attended the Mid-Year Meeting on Sunday, July 27th. We have some exciting plans for the fall and want to remind everyone to save the date for the luncheon on Sunday, September 21st. We will be honoring Dean Hard for his many years of service as our Deacon and Choirmaster and officially welcoming Dana Robinson as our new Organist and Choirmaster.

Dean's official retirement from Choirmaster was effective Sunday, June 8th, after serving in this position for 50 years. I first met Dean in 2003 when I joined the choir and congregation. For a cumulative 17 years (minus years away from Seattle and the birth of my second child), I sang and worshiped in the gallery alongside Dean. He always delighted me with his stories and humor. The movements and sways of his conducting during all the choir pieces we performed helped to enhance, emphasize, and evoke the power of the message and praise to God. I recall times when the music was particularly moving, and Dean would react with great affection, either from the gallery or down in the narthex. Dean once described to me that it felt like the music was "cascading down from the gallery like a waterfall." Seeing his reaction always made me feel that I had a deeper purpose in our worship services. I'll never forget the hug I received from Dean when I first returned home after living away from Seattle for a few years—it was a firm embrace followed by tears of joy. Dean is truly a treasure, and I wish him the very best in retirement

As fall begins, we are excited to announce our new stewardship campaign: Growing in Giving. Our previous process for collecting pledges for the next year was a pledge card distribution. This year, with the Growing in Giving campaign, we are looking to grow stewardship throughout the congregation. We've asked the Church Council to start the process in late August. Their pledges and testimonies will be shared on a visual display starting on Sunday, September 14th. The display will be updated weekly as new pledges are received. The campaign will conclude after three weeks on Sunday, October 5th, and we will have a little extra treat during coffee hour to celebrate!

Growing in Giving

The "Growing In Giving" Stewardship Campaign officially started with the church council on August 28th. The council has been asked to submit their pledges and testimonies about why they give. Beginning on September 14th, a display will be placed in the church lobby to highlight our pledged progress and the testimonies for everyone to see. Our hope is to inspire others to make their stewardship pledge. For those who haven't pledged before, we encourage you to join us in supporting our ministry at the conclusion of the campaign on October 4th.

As for my own stewardship testimony, I grew up in a Baptist church in south Seattle. The congregation was created to serve the Chinese community in Seattle. My grandparents were devoted followers of Christ. My grandmother was especially well known for cooking Sunday lunches. She could be found cooking on the wok in the church's commercial kitchen, preparing large trays of food for everyone to eat after the service. My father and I would wake up early Sunday morning to retrieve the church vans. We used them to pick up all the elderly throughout south Seattle and Chinatown. My job, at elementary school age, was to jump out of the passenger seat, open the doors, and assist the elderly into the van. My early understanding of stewardship was learned by watching my family's involvement.

Proverbs 11:25 "A generous person will prosper; whoever refreshes others will be refreshed."

As an adult and since attending FLCWS, I've learned more about tithing. In my first year on the church council, I was assigned to write the stewardship article and realized I hadn't truly reflected on what stewardship meant. I've learned that beyond the ideal of a 10% pledge, our financial giving is a fuel for our worship, enabling our community to be enriched with music, scripture, and the gospel. It's a vital part of how we're renewed, refreshed, and rejuvenated by God's Word. This renewal extends to the sense of community we share, from potlucks to coffee hours. I enjoy these gatherings and wish we had more of them. Our cheerful giving, as mentioned in 2 Corinthians 9:7, isn't just a financial act but also a source of joy that we share with one another through fellowship. May we all continue to be cheerful givers in every sense.

Pray for our country, that our collective actions may honor God and be a blessing in the world.


Pray for our leaders, that they may govern with wisdom, justice, and mercy.


Yehiel Curry was elected July 30 at the 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly to serve a six-year term as presiding bishop of the ELCA. Additionally, he is the first Black presiding bishop of the ELCA.

Speaking to the assembly after his election, Curry reflected on his membership at Shekinah Chapel in Riverdale, Ill., where he eventually became a lay mission developer. During that time he participated in the Theological Education for Emerging Ministries program, which prepares individuals for ordained ministry in the ELCA, with a focus on emerging ministry contexts like ethnic-specific, multicultural, and both rural and urban settings. He spoke to the assembly about his initial hesitation in accepting that first ministry role:

"I'm what a return on your investment looks like," he said. "Perhaps I'm out there in one of you. I never saw myself as good enough, so for two years, I said no. I finally said yes. When I said yes, your support, this church's support, of that ministry meant everything. So if you want to know what your benevolence dollars look like, it looks like me. And I want to say thank you. Thank you for your investment"

Curry has served as bishop of the ELCA Metropolitan Chicago Synod since 2019. He previously served as mission developer (2009-2012) and pastor (2012-2019) of Shekinah.

He received a Bachelor of Arts from Lewis University in Romeoville, Ill., in 1995 and a Master of Divinity from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (LSTC) in 2013. LSTC is one of seven ELCA seminaries.

HOLY CROSS, SEPTEMBER 14

These Sundays after Pentecost are also known as the "long green and growing sea-

son." This year, the Gospel is from St. Luke and our Sunday readings contain many of Jesus' teachings, miracles, and parables. While a light shines upon the mystery of Christ in the Christmas and Easter cycles, these Sundays in ordinary time focus on Jesus' call to follow him in daily discipleship. particular Sunday, that festival may take precedence on that Sunday. This is what happens every year, for example, in mid-August with the feast of Mary, Mother of our Lord. This month, Holy Cross Day, September 14, falls on a Sunday.

COMMUNION IN THE CHAPEL

This month we begin another Sunday service at 8:00 a.m. each Sunday. "Communion in the Chapel" begins on



September 21st. This service is simple and without music. This new service is new to many but a recovery of an old practice to many others. For many years before the COVID epidemic a

service like this was held. Following the older practice, the service will take place every Sunday except on festivals. On Festival Sundays such as Reformation, All Saints or Easter, the chapel community is invited to join the rest of the church congregation for worship at 10:30 a.m. in the main sanctuary.

According to legend the Empress Helena was involved in an excavation when she discovered

the true cross of Christ. This is the primary narrative around the origin of this festival. Another legend says that the cross was constructed from the wood of the Tree of Life in the Garden of Eden. In the fourth century, after Emperor Constantine outlawed crucifixions, Christians began to use the cross as a source of their identity. This festival of the

Holy Cross praises God for God's surprising wisdom revealed in the cross. An instrument of torture has become a flowering tree.
